
Story 2

Maybe there is a church, playing field, a river or a small store.








What are cultural features?

Culture is about our way of life. Features are the things of culture that can be seen. I think “cultural features” are what we do as part of our way of life. Think of the carvings made by the people of Marovo, or the shell money made by the people of Langa Langa. These are cultural features.

This is Nepia.




“Cultural features” are the parts of our way of life that can be seen, touched, tasted, smelled or heard. The languages we speak and the dances we dance are features of our cultures. They are part of our identity and pride as people of a place.






Hello, my name is Pita. We can take tourists to the bush and show them the remains of our ancestors. In some places there are still some important traditional **artefacts** in the shrines to see, for example smoking pipes and shell money.

I am Alerade. We organise cultural festivals in our schools. In these festivals we put on dances, play traditional games and show our skills by making shell money. We also play traditional music, sing traditional songs and put on dramas that show our customs, such as the paying of bride price.

Things that are the same and different in cultures

This is David from Solomon Islands.

In my village we sometimes cook our food in a *motu*, a stone oven. We heat up the stones in a big fire. When they are hot enough, we take them out, put the food in after wrapping them with leaves, put the hot stones back in and cover the oven with a lot of leaves. After a few hours the oven is uncovered. Then we have delicious food to eat. Other people in the Solomon Islands do the **same**.

This is Etuate from Fiji.

In our village, we sometimes cook our food in a *motu*, but in Fiji we have a **different** name. We call it a *lovo*. We dig a hole in the ground for the *lovo*. After wrapping the food with leaves we put the food in the *lovo* and cover it with soil, not leaves like you do. The food is delicious.




Hello, I am Aneti. We have a rich culture. We still keep our traditional way of living. For example, we still use firewood to cook our food. We speak our own language without any English words creeping into it. Our dances are still the kind of dances that our ancestors practised in the very early days. We do not dance borrowed dances like the Tamure dance.

Hello, my name is Kazukuru. Some of our important cultural features are dying. There is a lot of influence from other people. For example, in our language we use English words that are used if people talk to each other. This is sad. Maybe in the future our language will disappear.



Hello, I am Devi. Our culture is still alright. But we must be careful. There is a lot of development going on in our area. If we are not careful, other cultures will take over and in the future our children will not know their own culture. Our identity as a group of people will go away. We will have no pride in ourselves as a special group of people.

Hello, my name is Neirade. I have seen some changes taking place around us. But this makes me want to look after our culture. It helps us to keep pride in who we are.
